AN OVERVIEW

An inspection is a thorough process carried out by the Independent Schools Inspectorate (ISI) and overseen by the Department for Education (DfE), typically occurring every three years.

In October 2024, St Margaret's Prep experienced a comprehensive inspection by the ISI using the newly implemented Framework 23, which was introduced in September 2023.

Importantly, this new framework no longer provides overall judgments or grades from the ISI. Instead, the inspection report is organised around five key areas, where inspectors carefully outline commendations for 'Standards Met' and offer insightful feedback, addressing areas needing improvement where standards are not yet fulfilled.

We are thrilled to announce that St Margaret's achieved the best possible rating of 'Standards Met' in all five areas. This accomplishment reflects the hard work and commitment of our exceptional team.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS
